

What is Historic City Hall?

Lake Charles' Historic City Hall opened its doors in 1911, replacing the old city hall that was destroyed by the Great Fire of 1910. It served as the seat of city government for more than 70 years.

In 2005, the City of Lake Charles repurposed the building as an arts and cultural center. Now, Historic City Hall houses world-class exhibitions on national tour, as well as works from local and regional artists.

The building was the vision of the noted architects Favrot and Livaudais of New Orleans. The Italianate design was a classic choice for civic buildings in the early years of the last century. Historic City Hall is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.
